Contractions

Using contractions can make reading, writing or speaking quicker by joining two words together to make one word.

The missing letters are replaced by an apostrophe.

These words are called **contractions**.

 $\begin{array}{ccc} \text{did not} & \longrightarrow & \text{didn't} \\ \text{I am} & \longrightarrow & \text{I'm} \end{array}$

• When we write contractions, an apostrophe is used to show omission (where one or more letters have been taken out).

should have \longrightarrow should've

Here, the apostrophe shows that 'ha' has been removed.

could not → couldn't

Here, the apostrophe shows that 'o' has been removed.


