<p>Visit</p> <p>Visit the Tank Museum and explore life in the trenches, military vehicles and much more.</p> <p>Visit the Russell Cotes Museum and view their WW1 collection.</p> <p>Visit the Peace Garden of St James' Church or their WW1 display.</p>	<p>Create</p> <p>Create your own WW1 model. It could be a tank, trench, plane or even a model of trench foot!</p> <p>Create a poster to try and persuade young men to sign up to fight in the war.</p>	<p>Write</p> <p>Write a story about life in the trenches. Think about the living conditions and what you would see, smell, hear and feel.</p> <p>Write a diary account for a soldier, nurse or a child who has been affected by WW1.</p>	<p>Research</p> <p>Research one of the following war time topics and create an information leaflet or powerpoint :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• War time animals<ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ Women in the war• Advancements in technology• Developments in prosthetics (plastic surgery)
<p>Explore</p> <p>Explore your family history. Do you have anyone in your family history who fought in WWI? Find out about their story.</p> <p>Or choose someone from our local area listed on the war memorials. What can you find out about them?</p>	<p>Draw</p> <p>Draw or paint a poppy. You could use a range of media or materials.</p> <p>Draw or paint a portrait of a soldier or a nurse.</p>	<p>Watch</p> <p>Watch Horrible Histories WW1 for some fascinating and gruesome facts.</p> <p>Watch clips of the Remembrance Services from around the country. What do you notice about the services?</p>	<p>Discuss</p> <p>Discuss why and how WW1 started. What could have been done to prevent the outbreak of war?</p> <p>Discuss with your family why it is important to remember WW1. Should it be compulsory for all children to study?</p>
